DAVID STEWART, born Kilmadock, Perthshire, 1799, sixth son of Duncan S., farmer; educated at Univ. of Glasgow; M.A. (1819); licen. by Presb. of Glasgow 9th June 1824; ord, to Kinlochspelvie 11th Sept. 1828; trans. and adm. 25th April 1844; found dead in bed 8th May 1860. He was a man of original character and of mark in the country, prepossessing in his personal appearance, a scholar, a theologian, and esteemed for gentleness of disposition combined with firmness of principle. He crected at his own expense a commodious chapel and schoolhouse about eight miles distant from the parish church.

Presb. of Skye in 1866; assistant at Straloch, Moulin; ord. to St Columba's Parish, Paisley, 23rd Dec. 1869; trans. to Cumlodden 30th Oct. 1873; trans. to Oban 25th Dec. 1878; trans. and adm. 23rd Sept. 1890. Marr. 26th June 1889, Amelia Isabel Fraser, daugh. of Archibald Campbell M'Intyre, min. of Kilbrandon, and has issue-John Hope Robertson, M.B., Ch.B., captain R.A.M.C., served in East Africa, born 13th Oct. 1890; Mary Ralston, born 15th Nov. 1891 (marr. 4th Aug. 1920. Herbert George Wisley); Margaret Isabella, born 23rd Aug. 1893; Alastair M'Intyre, M.B., Ch.B., born 24th June 1896; Amelia Helena, born 8th May 1898; William Duncan, born 15th Nov. 1899.

COLL.

[The church of Coll was dedicated to St Finan. On 31st July 1618 the parishes of Kirkapol and Sorobie in Tiree and that of Coll were united. Early in the nineteenth century a parliamentary chapel was built in Coll. On 15th March 1865 the parish of Coll was disjoined quoad omnia from Kirkapol and Sorobie. There were of old two chapels in Coll, St Bride's at Cill Bride and St Kenneth's at Cill Choinnich.]

HEW [or EWEN] MT.EAN, M.A.;

1621 adm. before 1621. Bishop Knox, reporting on his diocese, wrote, "This yle is servit yeirlie by Mr Hew M'Cleane." He was afterwards min. of Killean (Torosay) in 1626, and of Iona about 1630.

HECTOR MACLEAN, M.A., born 1696, son of Ewen M. of Treshnish; app. Gaelic Bursar of Synod of Fife, 26th Sept. 1728, to serve in the Highlands; ord. (at Tayinloan) 14th May 1733; died 10th April 1775. He marr. 22nd June 1743, Janet (died at Coll, 2nd Aug. 1791), daugh. of Hector M'Lean, tacksman of Knock, and had issue—Margaret, born 22nd May 1745, died young; Florence, born 15th Oct. 1747 (marr. Captain Lachlan Maclean of the Coll family); Allan, an officer in

the army, born 23rd April 1751, died at sea, coming from New York; Margaret, born 28th July 1752 (marr. Alexander Maclean of Mingary). Describing his visit to Coll in 1773, Dr Samuel Johnson wrote: "We called on Mr Hector Maclean, the minister of Coll, whom we found in a hut, that is, a house of only one floor, but with windows and chimney, and not inelegantly furnished. Mr M. has the reputation for great learning; he is seventy-seven years old, but not infirm, with a look of venerable dignity excelling what I remember in any other man. His conversation was not unsuitable to his appearance. I lost some of his goodwill by treating a heretical writer with more regard than, in his opinion, a heretic could deserve. I honoured his orthodoxy, and did not much censure his A man who has settled his asperity. opinions does not love to have the tranquillity of his conviction disturbed; and at seventy-seven it is time to be in earnest. . . . He has no public edifice for the exercise of his ministry, and can officiate to no greater number than a room can contain, and the room of a hut is not very large. This is all the opportunity of worship that is now granted to the inhabitants of the islands, some of whom must travel thither perhaps ten miles. Two chapels were erected by their ancestors, of which I saw the skeletons, which now stand faithful witnesses of the triumph of the Reformation." — [Clan Gillean, 334; A Journey to the Western Isles.]

NEIL MACDOUGALL, min. at Eldon, Canada; adm. here 24th Sept. 1877; dep. by General Assembly 29th May 1895; was reponed and app. to Gaelie Chapel, Rothesay, 1905 (q.v.).

1895 M.A.; ord. 4th Dec. 1895; trans. to
Gaelie Parish (St Oran's), Edinburgh,

DUGALD MACECHERN, M.A., B.D.; missionary at Lochranza; adm. 20th April 1898; trans. to Bower 13th May 1908.

HECTOR WILLIAM MACKAY, M.A., B.D.; ord. 31st Aug. 1908; trans. to Snizort 5th April 1916.

NEIL M'KILLOP, born Ardchattan, 1917 6th July 1866, son of Archibald M. and Sarah M'Kechnie; educated at Lochnell School; licen. by Presb. of Mull 29th Aug. 1917; ord. 17th Sept. 1917. Marr. 12th June 1891, Caroline Elizabeth, daugh. of Henry Ritchie, and has issue—Sarah, born 18th March 1892; Henry Joseph, farmer, born 16th March 1896; Archibald, farmer, born 14th July 1897; Alexander Donald, clerk, born 21st Oct. 1898; Elizabeth Ada, born 2nd March 1908.

HEYLIPOL, OR SOROBIE (Q.S.).

[Tiree was divided of old between two parishes. Of these, Kirkapol included all the north-eastern part of the island, while the south-west formed the parish of Sorobie. On 31st July 1618 the three parishes of Kirkapol, Sorobie, and Coll were united. During the nineteenth century a chapel for the southern part of Tiree was built at Heylipol, a more accessible site than Sorobie. On 15th Feb. 1875 the parish of Heylipol, or Sorobie, was severed again from Kirkapol. There were within the bounds of Sorobie two chapels, St Kenneth's at Cill Choinnich, and St Luag's at Cill Mo Luaig. Ruins of both still exist. There are now mission chapels at Cornaig and Balevullin.

JOHN SMITH, born 1878; educated at
Univ. of Edinburgh; M.A. (1903);
ord. to Kilbride Mission, Kilfinan,
15th July 1908; trans. and adm. 3rd Feb.

1910; res. 20th Aug. 1912. Joined the Scottish Episcopal Church; min. of Christ Church, Calton, Glasgow; curate St John's Wood, London, 1915; vicar of a parish in Buckinghamshire in 1915; res. 1918, and became a teacher in Newcastle-upon - Tyne. Marr. Jan. 1914, Mary Catherine Mackinnon, who divorced him, 10th Nov. 1919.

ALEXANDER GRANT, born Tong,
Stornoway, 12th Aug. 1862, son of
Alexander G. and Christina M'Leod;
educated at Stornoway School and Univ. of
Glasgow; ord. to Trumisgarry 10th Sept.
1890; trans. to Bernera 9th Feb. 1904;
trans. and adm. 20th March 1913; died
20th June 1913. He marr. 19th Dec. 1890,
Christina Grant, eldest daugh. of Thomas
Miller, merchant, Glasgow, and Elizabeth
Dewar, and had issue—Esther Eva, born
8th Sept. 1893; Nellie Evelyn, born 14th
June 1895; Ruth Elizabeth, born 26th
Sept. 1898; Edith Christina, born 22nd
Feb. 1902.

ALEXANDER MACBEAN, born Bowmore, Islay, 23rd July 1877, son of David M. and Catherine Forbes; educated at Bowmore School and Univ. of Glasgow; M.A. (1902); licen. by U.F. Presb. of Dingwall in 1905; assistant at Tain and Beauly; ord. to Kilcalmonell U.F. Church in 1906; trans. to Lismore U.F. Church in 1909; trans. and adm. to this charge 8th Jan. 1914. Marr. 29th July 1914, Isabella, daugh. of Edward Thomson, H.M. Customs, Liverpool, and Margaret Begg, and has issue—Kenneth Forbes, born 15th June 1915; Margaret Helen, born 23rd Dec. 1917.

ICHOLUMKILL, OR IONA (Q.S.).

[In the year 563 St Columba came to this island, then called I or Hi, and here he founded his monastery. In later times Icholumkill formed a parish, with its church dedicated to St Ronan. Of that building the traces are now but scanty. Early in the seventeenth century the three parishes of Kilfinichen, Kilvicheoan, and Icholumkill were united. In 1828 a parlia-

JOHN MATHESON MACLEOD, born
1919 Stornoway, 18th May 1880, son of
Angus M., min. of Knock; educated
at Nicolson Institute and Univ. of Glasgow; licen. by Presb. of Toronto 22nd
April 1909; ord. to Hampden, Presb. of
Quebee, 28th July 1909; missionary of
Canadian Presbyterian Church in Korea
Oct. 1909 to March 1911; adm. to Church
of Scotland by General Assembly May 1913;
assistant at Dunkeld and Beauly; adm. to
this charge 10th July 1919. Marr. 14th
June 1913, Jeanie, daugh. of John Nicolson
and Allina Campbell, and has issue—Allina
Catherine, born 14th July 1914.

TIREE, OR KIRKAPOL.

[In the sixth century St Breandan built a church at Kirkapol in the north-east of Tiree. The ruins of a later parish church, over thirty-five feet in length, still mark its site. After a time Tiree was divided into two parishes. Of these, Kirkapol contains all the north-eastern portion of the island, and the south-western part forms the parish of Sorobie. On 31st July 1618 the three parishes of Kirkapol, Sorobie, and Coll were united. On 11th March 1865 Coll was severed from the two parishes in Tiree. On 15th February 1875 Heylipol or Sorobie was disjoined from Kirkapol, the

only remaining portion of the former united parishes of Tiree. Within the bounds of Kirkapol there were three chapels. The ruins of that of St Oran at Cladh Odhrain near Kirkapol still stand. The other chapels were St Bride's at Cill Bhride, and St Finain's at Cill Fhinain.

THOMAS KNOX, M.A.; app. Dean of the Isles 4th Aug. 1617; became min. in 1618, and was elected Bishop of the Isles in 1619 (q.v.).

MARTIN MILVRA, M.A.; was min.

1626 here in 1626 when Bishop Knox reported on the state of his diocese; trans. to Killean (Torosay) before 22nd March 1631.

FARQUHAR FRASER [or FRAZER], born near Stratherrick, Invernessshire, about 1606, said to be a cadet of the family of Lovat through the family of Tober; educated at Univ. of St Andrews; M.A. (1629); pres. by John, Bishop of the Isles, 1st March, and inst. (at Sorobie) 28th July 1633; became preacher in Sir Lachlan MacLean's Regiment in 1645 under Montrose, for which he was debarred from his charge and stipend and plundered by Campbell of Ardnamurchan. In 1662 he had a grant from vacant stipends; died 14th Feb. 1680. He was the first minister who constantly preached here and was very diligent among his people, not only in matters of faith and religion but in secular subjects also. It is said that at his coming only three persons (all MacLeans) could write their names. He marr. Janet, daugh. of Lachlan MacLean of Coll, and had issue —John, his successor in the charge.—[Clan Gillean, 373; P. C. Dec.; Craven's Records of Argyll, 411-12.]

JOHN FRASER [or FRAZER], born 1678 Mull, 1647, son of preceding; educated at Univ. of Glasgow; M.A. (July 1667); pres. and coll. by Bishop Andrew Knox 1st Dec. 1677, and inst. April 1678. He did not conform to Presbyterianism at the Revolution, but continued to occupy the charge till 26th

Oct. 1697 when it was declared vacant. Even after that date he remained in the parish preaching and discharging ministerial duties and subsisting on the charity and benevolence of the parishioners. He is said to have won twenty-four families in Coll to Protestantism. He was a learned and good man, very beneficial to his parishioners on account of his wise and winning disposition, understanding well their character and habits. He died 25th Aug. 1702. 1713 Aug. 1713 when he is named as a
member of Synod; still in the charge
8th Dec. 1714.

WILLIAM MORRISON, born about 1717 1690; educated at Univ. of Glasgow; ord. 4th Oct. 1717; died of fever in Glasgow, 25th Aug. 1735. He marr. Elizabeth Cameron, and had issue—John of Achnaba; she marr. (2) 19th July 1749. M. was the grandfather of the wife of Norman Macleod, min. of Morven.—[Acts of Ass., 1716; Clan Campbell, ii., 68.]

CHARLES CAMPBELL of Barmollach,
born about 1700, son of Malcolm C.
of Barmollach; educated at Univof Edinburgh; M.A. (13th March 1718);
licen. by Presb. of Inveraray 15th July
1723; ord. missionary at Jura 21st Sept.
1749; pres. by Archibald, Duke of Argyll,
April, trans. and adm. 26th May 1754;
died 8th Dec. 1779. He marr. 25th June
1757, Elizabeth Campbell, who died 13th
Dec. 1781, and had issue—John, born 26th
July 1758; Malcolm, born 31st Jan. 1761;
Robert, born 11th Feb. 1763; Janet, born
8th Jan. 1767.—[Tombst.]

ARCHIBALD M'COLL, born Oban, 1746, second son of John M.; edueated at Univ. of Glasgow; licen. by Presb. of Mull 22nd March 1776; ord. missionary at Tarbert in 1777; pres. by John, Duke of Argyll, 3rd April, trans. and adm. 31st Aug. 1780. He was rebuked by the Presb. in 1788 for celebrating a marriage clandestinely without proclamation of banns or before witnesses. He died 11th March 1814. He marr. 23rd Aug. 1785, Flora (died 4th July 1831), daugh. of Coll M'Dougal of Ardineaple, and had issue — twins (unnamed), born and died July 1786; Coll, born 24th July 1787; John, born 19th March 1790; Margaret, born 13th Nov. 1791 (marr. John M'Lean of Kilmaluag); Colin, born 6th July 1793; Catherine, born 2nd and died 8th April 1795; Catherine, born 2nd Jan. 1797; Isobel, born 7th Oct. 1798; Donald, min. of Glenorchy and Inishail, born 15th Dec. 1799; Flora, born 26th Nov. 1802; Anne, born 6th Oct. 1803; Helen, born 20th May 1805; Janet, born 2nd June 1807 (marr. Lachlan Mackenzie, min. of Jura); Alexander, born 30th Oct. 1809. Publication -Account of the Parish (Sinclair's Stat. Acc., x.).—[Clan Gillean, 325.]

JOHN M'KINNON, born Island of
Arran, about 1745, eldest son of
Duncan M., farmer; educated at
Univ. of Glasgow; after licence he became
tutor to the family of the Duke of Argyll;
took orders in Church of England and was
app. Chaplain to 3rd Foot; D.D. (Edin-

burgh, 24th June 1794); pres. by George William, Duke of Argyll, Sept. 1814; ord. 27th April 1815. Being in feeble health he left the island without leave being given by the Presb., and went to reside at Ayr. On 6th June 1815 he was ordered back to his parish. A letter from him, dated 11th July, explained that the state of his health forbade such a step, and that under the circumstances the patron had appointed an assistant and successor. On 7th Nov. he was again enjoined to return, but again declined, stating, however, that he had arranged for the pastoral duties to be carried on until his successor was admitted. On revising the proceedings of the Presb., the Synod, on 7th Aug. 1816, recorded their high disapprobation of the conduct of the Presb., particularly for proceeding in such ordination and admission without requiring a certificate from the Presb. in whose bounds M. had resided, which was the more necessary in his case as it was publicly reported and generally believed that he had for many years before been in orders of the Church of England. The Presb. was rebuked. M. had never been present as a member of the Court. He died at Ayr 21st March 1816, four months before the meeting of Synod. [See Hew Scott, vol. iii., 90, for a copy of M.'s letter to the Presb.] He marr, in 1802 Isabella (died 21st Jan. 1864), daugh, of Lewis Fullarton of Kilmichael, Arran, and had issue—Elizabeth, born 10th May 1805; Campbell, born 27th Sept. 1807; Charlotte, born 17th March 1809; Lewis, born 10th Nov. 1811; John, C.B., M.D., Inspector-General, H.E.I.C.S., born 8th March 1813, died 2nd March 1871,

NEIL MACLEAN, born 11th July 1784,

1817 son of Donald M., min. of Small Isles; educated at Univ. and King's College, Aberdeen; M.A. (30th March 1801); licen. by Presb. of Skye 22nd July 1808; ord. (assistant) at Coll 26th June 1809; trans. to Small Isles (in succession to his father) 16th June 1811; pres. by George William, Duke of Argyll, 27th July 1815; trans. and adm. (by one min. only, who had been detained three days at the

Ferry before being able to cross, the others being prevented by "the violence of the winds and the very heavy sea") 7th March 1817. He died 26th Aug. 1859. He marr. 8th May 1814, Isabella, youngest daugh. of Major Alexander Macdonald of Vallay, North Uist, and had issue—Donald, M.D., born 27th Sept. 1815; Harriet, born 9th June 1817; Maria Flora, born 14th Dec. 1818, died young; Alexander, went to Australia, born 30th June 1820; Lilias Margaret, born 4th Sept. 1822 (marr. 9th July 1849, William Mitchell, St Ninians), died 1877; Isabella, born 24th Oct. 1824 (marr. 8th July 1852, Alexander Wentworth Cameron of Glen Nevis). JOHN GREGORSON CAMPBELL, born Kingairloch, 1836, second son of John C., captain of the Cygnet, and Helen MacGregor of the family of Mac-Gregor of Roro in Glenlyon; educated at Appin School, High School and Univ. of Glasgow: studied law for some time: licen. by Presb. of Glasgow in 1858; pres. by George Douglas, Duke of Argyll, in 1860; ord. 23rd Aug. 1861, after appeal to the General Assembly, the settlement being opposed by the parishioners; died unmarr. 22nd Nov. 1891. He was recognised as one of the greatest authorities on Celtic folk-lore. In person he was tall and fair, with deep blue eyes full of life and vivacity. He was noted at once for the kindliness of his manner and the shrewd causticity of his wit.
