### DEATH OF CAPTAIN McLEAN

The death is announced of **Captain Archibald McLean** on Saturday at Tiree, Hunters Hill in his 80<sup>th</sup> year, a native of Tiree, Argyleshire. Past Proprietor of steam colliers *Brunner*, *Timaru*, *Western* and *Tamar*. Before settling in Sydney 30 or 40 years ago he commanded his own vessel.

#### **Notes:**

Archibald McLean, son of Lachlan McLean & Catharene McNiel of Hough, Tiree, was born on 14 July 1821. The parish register lists 8 children born in Tiree to Lachlan McLean & Catharene McNiel:

Mary, 1808 Catharene, 1810 Lachlan, 1812 John, 1816 John, 1817 Archibald, 1821 Niel, 1823 Ann, 1829

The house "Tiree" in Tiree Avenue, Hunters Hill, once owned by Captain McLean, is now divided into a number of apartments. Its history is noted by Graham Spindler (2011) in *A Sydney Harbour Circle Walk 2011-2012: Historical Notes and Background:* 

At the bend in Tiree Av, at No 26, is the greatly altered house, Tiree. Built as an Anglican rectory, it was owned by Captain Archibald McLean from 1884 to 1902. A shipowner from Tiree in Scotland, the house's land in his time ran down to Fern Bay near Pulpit Point, glimpsed through the houses opposite. Here he berthed his ships including two China traders and two 'sixty-miler' colliers.
